Safe Living Subcommittee

The Safe Living Subcommittee deliberated on the postpartum support system on the first day of its fourth session. During the deliberation, opinions were expressed such as: "Is the postpartum support system of Kawasaki City well known not only to foreigners but also to Japanese people?" "The process of choosing a hospital, the maternal and child health handbook, and other matters from the time a baby is born may be common knowledge for Japanese people, but many foreigners may not know about them." Also, "I don't know where to get information in the first place." In putting together our recommendations, we hope to contribute to the creation of a city that is easy for everyone to live in, while keeping in mind that we are first and foremost "representatives of all foreign residents of Kawasaki City."

The Information and Society Subcommittee discussed information on the first day of its fourth session. The deliberations began with a review of the current status of the welcome set distributed at the ward office and other public offices, including its contents and distribution status. Then the committee expressed opinions such as: "There are welcome sets and QR translators and the information already provided is quite complete." "The issue is how to deliver information to those who really need it." "For that reason, it is important to make the One-Stop Center better known." "Representatives themselves can transmit and spread information via SNS." Also, "It is important to create routes to deliver information."

Open Meeting Held

The Open Meeting for 2022 was held on Sunday, December 11, at the Nakahara Civic Center. This was the first open meeting in three years, as it could not be held last year and the year before due to the novel coronavirus infection. In all, about 60 people attended this year's meeting, which was held from 2:00 to 5:00 pm.

At this open meeting, the participants were divided into two breakout sessions to exchange opinions on the six deliberated themes of the 14th term, and to receive the free opinion of participants. After the breakout sessions, the content of the breakout sessions was shared in a plenary session, which concluded with comments from KASHIWAZAKI Chikako, a professor at Keio University, and KADO Miyuki, a visiting researcher at the Institute of Human Sciences, Toyo University, who were invited to serve as commentators at the open meeting.













In the questionnaire, impressions were shared such as: "It was a very valuable experience for me because there were many things that I cannot see in my daily life as a Japanese person and that I cannot know unless I am made aware of them." "I learned a lot by listening to the opinions and questions actively expressed not only by the representatives but also by the participants." "I have been living in Kawasaki City for a year, but I didn't know much information about Kawasaki City, so I had a chance to learn about the issues and information of Kawasaki City by attending this subcommittee." "I think the Foreign Citizens Representative Assembly is a wonderful activity. It would be good if there were more opportunities for foreign and Japanese citizens to freely talk and deepen mutual understanding." Also, "I came to know about this conference because of my work, but I think most Japanese are unaware of the existence of such a conference. I think it would be a good idea to publicize this conference so that more Kawasaki citizens will be interested in it in the future."

After the meeting, a short social event was also held. Although there was no food or drink due to the coronavirus pandemic, many people attended and had a very enjoyable and meaningful time.

We will surely make use of the valuable opinions and advice we received this time in our future deliberations. Thank you very much to everyone who participated.

Then I noticed that not only the garbage trucks, but also bus drivers and train drivers would sometimes respond to us by honking their horns.





In Taiwan, where I come from, with its dense population and heavy traffic, it is hard to imagine such a scene because it is all one can do just to drive safely. It was wonderful to experience receiving this "shout out" to the little children and their parents.
